

Library To Expand

The Vaughan Library is presently under preliminary plans for extension. Dr. Hansen, the Provost, and the Library Reconstruction Committee are working in consultation with a Boston architect. However, no immediate work can be done as yet, until the committee receives official approval from the Provincial Government for the extension. When final approval is obtained, the committee will meet with local architects to finalize the preliminary plans.

The Library hopes to expand to its

fourth and fifth floors which are, at present, vacant. Dr. Hansen Proposes an expansion in technical services and bibliographies. New features that will be introduced to the Library are a map room, an up-to-date microfilm centre, and the Dr. W. Kirkconnell Room, which is dedicated to Dr. Kirkconnell. It will house valuable materials such as rare book holdings.

The actual work of the expansion will probably be after classes in spring, and is hoped to be finished by fall.

REV. POTTER VISITS WOLFVILLE

The Rev. Dr. Philip A. Potter, General Secretary of the World Council of Churches, will be speaking in Wolfville on Saturday evening, October 15, and Sunday morning, October 16, 1977.

Dr. Potter was born in the West Indies, studied theology in Jamaica and London, England, and was prominent as a Youth Leader at the First Assembly of the World Council of Churches, held in Amsterdam in 1948. For four years he served as a Methodist minister in Haiti, before becoming Secretary of the Youth department of the World Council of Churches in 1954. From 1960 to 1967 he was Field Secretary for Africa and the West Indies of the British Methodist Missionary Society, and from 1960 to 1968 he was Chairman of the World Student Christian Federation. In 1967 he returned to the staff of the World Council of Churches and in 1972 was elected General Secretary of that organization.

Dr. Potter is a Methodist, a member of

the Third World, and is much experienced in the affairs of the modern worldwide Christian Church. He is a lecturer and author of note and a preacher of exceptional power.

Dr. Potter's visit to Wolfville is sponsored by the Wolfville Inter-Church Council. Opportunities to hear Dr. Potter are as follows:

Saturday, 7:30 p.m., 15 October 1977, Denton Hall, Acadia University. Dr. Potter will lecture on World Christianity, and answer questions. This event will rally Valley Christianity, and answer from Acadia University and the Acadia Divinity College.
Sunday, 11:00 a.m., 16 October 1977, Wolfville Baptist Church. Public worship under the leadership of the Rev. Lloyd Archer, President of the Wolfville Inter-Church Council. Dr. Potter will be preaching.
